Dear General MacArthur:

I am writing you this personal letter about the military and security problems confronting us, for I know that you are in the best possible position to evaluate and adjudge their seriousness.

Although we do not wish to show publicly any sign of worry over the whole situation, we cannot help feeling very nervous. The Communists are spreading their propaganda story all through south Korea that the Americans are being forced to withdraw by pressure from Moscow, and that soon the north Korean Communists will sweep down to occupy our south, just as the Chinese Communists are now doing in China. They broadcast over the Pyongyang radio, and circulate in leaflets the terms of agreements signed between the north Korean Communist puppet and Moscow for mutual military defense. It is reported that over one hundred Japanese plane manufacturers and aviators have been brought to North Korea, and that a large contingent of the Japanese soldiers held in Manchuria are to be sent to north Korea by the Soviets.

These and many other stories are circulating among our people. One may dismiss them as Communist propaganda lies, but no one can deny or conceal the fact that the northern Communists are constantly coming over the 38th parallel to burn and destroy and kill wherever they can. Their mortar shells are frequently falling into the city of Kaesang and in country villages all along the line, which results in death, destruction and a nerve-wrecking uneasiness among our people. The United States authorities advise us not to worry, saying we shall have all the military aid we need when the situation requires it. In the meantime, my Defense Minister assures me we have munitions enough only to last for three days.

We have done everything we could to clean up completely the island of Cheju and other affected areas. But this cleaning up does not amount to much, for we have no way of preventing the constant infiltration of more Communists along the seacoasts. We need fast-running patrol boats, planes, and some heavier ships to guard our coast line. Without them it is impossible to keep the Communists out, and to stop the smuggling of rice and other commodities. We need planes for reconnaissance as well
